## Sign up for PulsePoint Respond Now and You Could Save a Life

The City is proud to announce the launch of the PulsePoint Respond smartphone app. Available for both iOS and Android devices, this app reports cardiac emergencies to registered users at the same time as the City's dispatch system sends out an Emergency Medical Service (EMS) team. The purpose is to allow cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) or automated external defibrillation (AED) to be administered more rapidly by nearby certified citizens and, thus, increase the chances of patient survival.

The app uses location-based technology to determine which registered and CPR/AED-certified users are within a 1/2-block radius of a cardiac emergency and notifies them via push notifications on

their smartphone. This app also maps all nearby publicly accessible AED units for use in life-saving efforts. There are currently more than 100 AED units in Naperville

registered with the system in public buildings, parks, schools, churches, businesses and museums, among other locations.

"According to the American

Heart Association, for each minute that CPR or defibrillation is not given to a cardiac patient, their chances of survival decrease by seven to 10 percent," Naperville Fire Chief Mark Puknaitis explained.

The Fire Department is also actively seeking new partnerships with local businesses and organizations interested in installing AED units. Fire personnel will assist with training employees in how to use the equipment properly. For more information on this opportunity, contact the Naperville Fire Department at (630) 305-5900.

### Trick-or-Treat Safety Tips

This year, Halloween will occur on Monday, October 31, 2016. The City of Naperville has no ordinance setting Trick-or-Treating hours for children, however here are safety tips to make Halloween fun and safe for all:

#### Adults

- Welcome trick-or-treaters with your porch or exterior lights on.
- Call 9-1-1 immediately to report suspicious activity.
- Do not give homemade or unwrapped treats to children.
- Inspect all candy and discard any homemade or unwrapped treats.

#### Kids and Teens

- Make sure costumes are flame retardant as well as short to prevent trips.
- Try make-up instead of a mask and avoid "terrorist type" costumes and those requiring weapons of any kind.
- Make sure to wear light colors or put reflective tape on costumes. Glow sticks are also a fun way to light the way.
- Practice safety in numbers and travel with older children or adults.
- Do not go inside anyone's home. Remain on the porch at all times.
- Do not accept rides from strangers.
- Look both ways before crossing the street and cross at corners only.
- Young children should end trick-or-treating when it begins to get dark.
- Do not take shortcuts through back yards, alleys or parks.
- Do not eat any treats until they have been inspected.

### The Time to Winterize is Now

Winter is just around the corner and preparing your home now means more relaxing when the temperature drops.

Using energy more efficiently — especially heating — during cold months can cut the amount of money you spend on your utility bill.

Start your energy efficiency check with your furnace. Replacing a dirty filter will increase the air flow and make your home more efficient with the added benefit of cleaner air. The money and energy you save each month will practically pay for the cost of a new filter.

If it is time to replace your old furnace, look for energy-efficient models. Furnaces with an Energy Star rating usually exceed federal standards for energy efficiency and can make choosing the right model that much easier. Installing an energy-efficient furnace can reduce your energy consumption and the cost of heating your house.

Check your home for air leaks. Depending on the location of the leak, there are a variety of actions you can take to plug the leak:

- Caulk and use weather stripping on doors and windows that leak air.
- Use a foam sealant on larger gaps around windows, baseboards and other places where there may be air leaks.
- Replace worn out door bottom weather strips and thresholds.
- Keep the fireplace flue damper tightly closed when not in use.

## Your Recycling Service: Blue vs. Green

The City would like to remind residents to dispose of garbage and recyclables separately and in the correct containers. City-issued blue carts are for **recycling only**.

Since the program's inception in 2014, Naperville's curbside recycling program has collected more than 16,000 tons of recyclables annually, which helps keep 30 percent of the City's waste from ending up in a landfill. However, we're seeing an increase in the number of residents using their blue recycling carts to dispose of waste items that are not recyclable. When non-recyclable items end up in the recycling container, the content is considered contaminated and everything, even the recyclable items, must be turned away by the City's recycling processor.

As a reminder, the following items are recyclable:

- Newspaper, magazines, books, office paper
- Paper bags
- Corrugated cardboard boxes, including frozen food boxes
- Glass bottles and jars
- Aluminum cans, foil and trays
- Plastic containers numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 7 (#6 not accepted)

If you find that you have more garbage than you can fit into your green City-issued garbage can, simply bag your extra waste and set it next to your City-issued garbage can or place it in an additional garbage container. Personal containers must be no larger than 32 gallons in capacity and 60 pounds in weight.

## Pet Safety in the Autumn

With the transition to autumn comes the fact that it gets darker outdoors much earlier and stays that way for a longer amount of time. The time change is not always an easy transition for humans, but let's not forget about the pets in our lives, either.

Owners should make certain pets always wear current tags and are microchipped so they can be located more efficiently, especially in an emergency. There are also reflective collars, vests, blinking lights and reflective tape to make pets more visible should they escape during a walk or when you let them out in the yard to relieve themselves.

Shelter hours are Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday and Sunday hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Our email is [animalcontrol@naperville.il.us](mailto:animalcontrol@naperville.il.us) and our voicemail is (630) 420-6178. If your pet goes missing after shelter hours, please contact Naperville Police Department at (630) 420-6666. An operator will take some initial information and also send you to the Animal Control Office's voicemail.

Halloween is a busy social season. Pet owners are reminded to make certain pets do not have access to candy, decorations and treats. These can cause serious illness and even death.

## Yard Waste Collection

Yard waste stickers for bagged yard waste are not required for pickup between October 31 and December 9, 2016. Simply put bags of yard waste on the curb on your regular garbage collection day.

All bagged and bundled yard waste collection ends December 9, 2016, and will resume March 13, 2017. Yard waste stickers will be required again on all bagged and bundled yard waste at this time.

## Leaf Collection Reminder

Naperville's bulk curbside leaf collection program begins in October.

The first two-week cycle is scheduled to begin October 17. The second two-week cycle is scheduled to begin on October 31, and the third and final cycle is set to kick off on November 14. The entire program should be complete by November 23.

Residents should rake leaves into the street by 6 a.m. on the first day of their collection cycle. Crews will collect leaves once during each collection cycle. Leaf volumes and weather uncertainties make it impossible for the City to guarantee curbside leaf collection on a specific day.
