## A Note from Chief Arres

To the Naperville Community:

In a year marked by good policework, community engagement, and progress on long-term projects, there is a lot to report from 2023.

Crime rates remained low for a city of our size. We were fortunate to see a decrease in crimes against persons and only a slight increase in property crimes compared to the year before. Still, our emergency telecommunicators answered more than 63,000 9-1-1 calls and our officers were either dispatched to or proactively initiated more than 76,000 events over the course of 2023.

Keeping up with that volume of work takes a large and well-trained staff. We hired and trained 30 new employees and conducted ongoing training for our existing staff. Year after year, our training continues to improve, particularly in the area of scenario-based training. In 2023, our Professional Development and Training Unit facilitated nearly 7,900 hours of inhouse training for our employees.

Improvements are also underway to enhance both our workspace and how we do business day-to-day. We completed a remodel of our patrol area, the first of many projects to update, renovate and enhance our 33-year-old building. We also continued to set the foundation for two monumental technology projects – the replacement of our radio system as well as our Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD), Mobile Data Terminal (MDT) and Records Management System (RMS) solutions. Our radio system is critical in that it connects us to our staff in the field, while the CAD/MDT/RMS systems are the backbone of how we collect and share information on emergency calls, relay confidential and restricted information, and store data and reports. Once complete, these technologies will play a critical role in how we do business.

In addition to all the emergency response, crime investigation and behind-the-scenes projects we worked on in 2023, we also kept our promise to prioritize community engagement. We held more Chats with the Chief in one year than ever before, held two successful Citizen Police Academies, and gave more crime prevention and community education presentations than the year prior.





# **Policy & Budget**

The Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, better known as CALEA, was created in 1979 as a qualifying authority through joint efforts of law enforcement's major national and international executive associations. The purpose of CALEA is to improve the delivery of public safety services by maintaining professional standards.

The Naperville Police Department has been accredited since 1992, the Emergency Communications Center since 2001. Maintaining compliance includes continuous policy and procedure reviews, gathering proofs of compliance, and on-site visits from CALEA assessment teams every four years. This voluntary, rigorous process helps ensure the Naperville Police Department follows the best professional practices.

The Police Department and Emergency Communications Center completed another four year assessment in the fall of 2023, which paved the way to reaccreditation in 2024.




# Technology

The Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) Team consists of 14 FAA-licensed pilots responsible for operating drones to support police operations. Adhering to FAA protocols, this team plays a crucial role in:

- Enhancing situational awareness for incident commanders in high-risk/low-frequency scenarios
- Documenting training exercises and traffic accident scenes
- Conducting reconnaissance at special events
- Assisting in search and rescue operations and public health crises



Here are a few examples of drones elevating department operations.



In August, officers were dispatched to the Odyssey Fun World in reference to a burglar alarm. As officers arrived on scene, the building owner notified dispatch that he observed two subjects inside the building on the security cameras without permission. Officers set up a perimeter and observed two suspects run from the building. One of the suspects was caught after a brief foot chase while the other evaded police, initially. The UAS team deployed their newest drone and searched the wooded and grassy area adjacent to the building until the pilot located a heat signature using the drone's thermal camera. The UAS team was able to direct officers to the offender hiding in the brush and take him into custody.



In October, officers responded to an address in town in to a check on the well-being of a potential suicidal subject. Officers spoke with family members who showed text messages from the subject stating that she wanted to kill herself and referenced "suicide by cop" should the police show up to help. Officers searched the area but were unable to locate the subject. A drone was launched and located a female running through yards nearby. She hid by a large tree and the pilot was able to direct officers to the female where she was taken into protective custody and transported to Edward Hospital for evaluation.

In December, officers responded to Knoch Knolls Park to assist another agency in locating a suicidal subject who had just been in an argument with his wife in their town and left with a gun. After the vehicle was located in the parking lot, responding officers attempted to search the area at night to no avail. NPD's UAS team launched their drone and after a short period of time, located the deceased victim nearby and were able to direct officers to the subject.


# **Training**

During 2023, the Professional Development and Training (PD&T) Unit provided 7,891 hours of in-house training including an array of classes covering de-escalation training/scenarios, rapid deployment/active shooter training/scenarios, vehicle pursuits and communication, firearms training, less lethal shotgun training, PepperBall, Taser, CPR recertification, Stop the Bleed, emergency vehicle operations, high-risk vehicle stops, Mobile Field Force equipment and tactics, and social services review.

### 2023 Field Training by the Numbers:

- 15 college students participated in the internship program
- Four new field training officers were selected
- 13 new or lateral officers were trained throughout the year
- Approximately 7,600 field training hours were tallied






# **Professional Standards**

The Office of Professional Standards (OPS) is responsible for all department investigations of alleged employee misconduct. During 2023, the Naperville Police Department recorded 17 citizen complaints, 25 citizen inquiries and 23 administrative or internal investigations involving sworn and civilian employees. Only 26 of the total filed complaints, inquiries, and administrative investigations were determined to be sustained cases of misconduct.

The OPS is also responsible for reviewing Response to Resistance (RTR) incidents for policy violations. Each of these incidents was subsequently reviewed by the supervisory chain of command for policy violations and documented by OPS.

# **Crime & Incident Data**

The Naperville Police Department presents the following overview of crime and incident data reported between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31, 2023.

Crimes against persons make up approximately one-quarter of the total crimes reported in Naperville in 2023. Approximately 94% of the reported crimes against persons fall into the categories of intimidation and simple assault, which includes altercations and incidents (including domestics) that don't involve weapons or serious injuries.

Nearly 65% of Naperville's reported crime in 2023 is classified as property crimes, most of which were theft, fraud (including identity theft) and vandalism.

### Here are a few additional take-aways from the 2023 statistics:

- Overall, there were fewer crimes against persons reported in 2023 compared to the previous year, but property crimes increased by almost 8%.
- Domestic batteries make up nearly 80% of all simple assaults.
- 29 criminal sexual assaults were reported to police in 2023. While it does not minimize the seriousness of this crime, we feel it is important for the community to know that none of the reported incidents involved an unknown person randomly attacking individuals on the streets of our community. In the majority of the cases reported in 2023, the victims knew or were somehow acquainted with the offender.
- The most significant increases in property crimes were seen in the categories of shoplifting, motor vehicle theft, impersonation/obstructing identification, and extortion/blackmail.
- Following two years of relatively low burglary numbers, reports of burglaries in Naperville surpassed 100 cases in 2023. Of the 111 cases reported, 57 were to commercial properties and 54 were to residences.
- 67% of residential burglaries were to unlocked or unsecured homes, but only 23% of commercial burglaries were believed to be unsecured.
- Reports of burglaries to motor vehicles were consistent with numbers reported over the last few years. 78% of the vehicles were believed to be unlocked at the time they were broken into.
- Motor vehicle thefts increased from 50 in 2022 to 81 in 2023. Thirty-five of the reported thefts are believed to be tied to a string of Hyundai and Kia thefts inspired by the Kia Boys trend on social media. Both Hyundai and Kia have offered anti-theft software upgrades and other programs to combat the trend.






