SUBJECT: Mosquito Abatement Program Update

Purpose:

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide information regarding the mosquito abatement program.

Discussion:

Mosquito abatement began in early May. The City of Naperville employs several strategies to control the mosquito population. The four strategies we employ are:

1. Source reduction is the practice of permanently eliminating breeding sites. City crews inspect for and remove standing water where possible.
2. Larviciding targets the mosquito in the larval stage. Chemicals are used to treat ponds and marsh areas, as well as all the city's 8,000 catch basins in May and June with larvicide briquettes.
3. Monitoring the mosquito population is done on a weekly basis through the use of ten gravid (female mosquito) traps. The traps are used to monitor the effectiveness of our larval control and to provide an early warning when adult populations are rising. The city tests mosquitoes caught in the traps for the presence of the West Nile Virus. The outcome of the test and the number of mosquitoes caught in the traps indicate when spraying is needed.
4. Spraying is the method most familiar to the public. Controlling the population of adult mosquitoes with chemicals is sometimes necessary. The city uses the safest chemicals available in very low volumes and sprays only as needed.

Mosquito populations are currently low, and trap testing will continue weekly through the remainder of the summer.

The DuPage County Health Department has an extensive mosquito trapping program throughout the county and maintains one gravid trap in Naperville. In addition, the DuPage County Forest Preserve also maintains a trap in Naperville. Both agencies will notify the city if the trap tests positive.

A press release will be sent out before Memorial Day weekend informing residents about our program and encouraging them to take the necessary precautions to avoid mosquito bites and to eliminate potential mosquito breeding areas from around their homes.

Recommendation:
